


St. Bartholomew's in London

There is one building more than another in London which has suffered through the vicissitudes of time to the church of St. Bartholomew, the "smooth field." If there is one charitable institution which through long centuries has ministered to the needs of the suffering poor it is St. Bartholomew's hospital, built by Sir Rahere, a monk, in the Boston town-ship.

Church and hospital are inseparable in their history and their life. They stand together today close to the great north market of the metropolis, where in ancient times, on the "smooth field" (St. Bartholomew's) tournaments were held, where the dagger of Watworth struck down Jack Cade and where martyrs passed "through the gate of life" for conscience sake, the whole the cruel and implacable heads of the church looked on at their sufferings.

The history of the hospital has been told in two sumptuous volumes by Sir Norman Moore, one of its most famous physicians, and this must be our excuse for following Moore, the most fascinating chronicler of an ancient London.

Rahere's Divine Vision.

It is of the church that one must speak first if we are to have a clear-cut understanding of all that is conveyed by the magic word "Bart." For the noble charity of which Sir Norman Moore discourses so eloquently was originally only a part of the larger scheme of the illustrious church of St. Bartholomew the Great, with its college of canons of the order of St. Augustine, popularly known as the Black Friars from the color of their distinctive habit.

Very soon land had to be given when Henry I. of England, A. M. 1123, at the request of a favorite named Rahere, who had been a religious organism of the day, determined on a pilgrimage to Rome, by this act of beneficence having to obtain complete forgiveness of his sins. After much had been reached the city and duly bewailed his sins but before long he fell sick and feeling that his end was nigh, he vowed that should he recover he would build a hospital for the healing of the poor.

One night on his way home, he dreamed that he found himself on the edge of a deep and dreadful pit, into which he feared to fall, when suddenly St. Bartholomew appeared to him and promised that if he would build a church in Smithfield he should have help. Rahere promised, and when he awoke he felt that this was indeed a divine vision, and that he must do the best of the blessed saint. So when after much trouble, he obtained from the king a grant of land in Smithfield he set to work to build the two-fold task of duty, to build a hospital for the poor and nearby a church.

Thus arose the hospital of St. Bartholomew and the church. Of the latter, Rahere became the first prior, but which was completed he cannot be decided though it appears that but a short space of time separated the two. This was in the year 1123 and ever since, for nearly six centuries the hospital has continued to carry out the objects of its founder.

Beautiful Tomb of the Founder.

When Rahere died in 1133 he was buried on the north side of the sanctuary, the customary position for a founder, and his grave and tomb have been preserved to this day. The beautiful tomb is probably the only one in England for it has suffered undisturbed for eight centuries.

Hit by hit the great church was completed. It drew into its walls from the three days' fair held at the Feast of St. Bartholomew, the cleric for which Rahere had obtained five years before his death, and to this


These members of the band of the battleship DeWain have made a reputation as the "jazz kings" of the Atlantic fleet.

Just Going Home, Not to a Fire





FINISH OFF FEEDERS EARLY

No Class of Cattle Yet Produced More Suitable for Market Demands Than Baby Beef.

Feeders show an increasing tendency toward finishing off their beef cattle at younger ages. In general this tendency is caused by two causes: first, the increasing demand for high-quality cuts of meat, second, the cost of producing beef, due to the increase in land values, labor and taxes. The tendency to finish off early feeders and to raise early weaners and their cattle to advanced ages at a profit, general conditions in the past few years have been such that the cost of beef production has nearly filled the requirements of high prices and so earlier than they be, and the feeding of baby beef has been increasing in popularity.

WORLD'S MOST COSTLY SHOW

International Horse Show at London, England, Said to Be Entitled to That Distinction.

The world's most costly show is the international horse show, which, after a lapse during the war years, was resumed this season. It is to be held at the Olympia London, England, and there who have seen it say it is a magnificent spectacle equal to the splendid pageants of ancient Rome and Greece. This is largely due to the high standard set by Lord Louis, who when he inaugurated the show four years ago. He then made it his mind to eclipse anything of the kind ever attempted before, and he succeeded. The huge hall was transformed into a gigantic arena of racing harked with costliest velvet and draped in silk. Nothing more beautiful had ever been seen in London. About thirty thousand people, \$250,000 was spent by him before ever the show was open, but he got it all back in one enormous money.

It is a fine thing, but to attempt in such multitudes that even that huge building could not contain them and more than twenty thousand people were crowded about from the show during the ten days the show lasted.

Presence of Fish Revealed.
