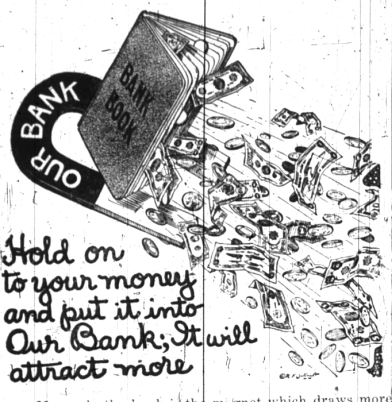

POST OFFICE INSPECTOR MAKES SUGGESTIONS

A postoffice inspector has recently made an investigation in Birmingham for the purpose of determining whether the establishment of city delivery service is feasible. If such service is established it will be necessary for each residence receiving service to be supplied with a mail receptacle of sufficient size to hold mail, erected at a convenient place for delivery, preferably in most instances, on the inside of a front porch post low enough to be reached by the carrier without climbing all of the porch steps. If front doors are supplied with slots the mail can be delivered through such slots, although receptacles are preferred. Mail receptacles that are now in use in the village delivery service should be placed in the most convenient place for the carrier to serve. While the business houses are not required to erect outside boxes, yet they should provide a place for the mail on the inside near the front door.
