GROWING WINTER WHEAT IN NORTH

Hardier Varieties Introduced That Give Better Yields and Mature Earlier.

BETTER DROUGHT RESISTANT

Better Selection of Seed Will Aid Yield.

Since the introduction of the hardy varieties of wheat from southern Europe there has been a decided northward movement of the winter-wheat area. This movement has been rapid in recent years. The reasons therefore are the generally large yields of winter wheat, first, to its earlier maturity, thus enabling it to escape both hot winds and drought, second, to its greater resistance to the winter wheat rusts, and third, to the better division of labor, which it allows through fall sowing and earlier harvesting.

The present production of winter wheat in the eastern part of the United States depends to a considerable extent on the choice of the best adapted varieties. In general, the soft red winter wheats are grown, although soft white winter wheats are popular in the northern United States, especially in New York and Pennsylvania.

Many farmers are doubtless growing winter wheat in general, but they might grow if they knew exactly what was adapted to their localities and farms. The United States Department of Agriculture has just issued Farm Better Varieties for Many Farms.
