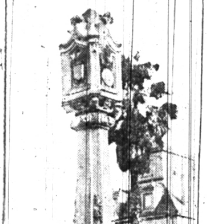

Double Japanese Wedding Performed in New York



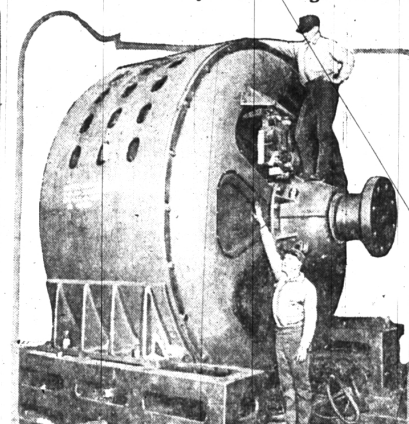

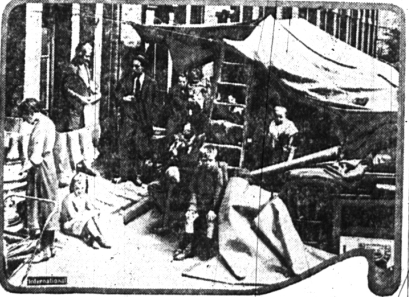

VIVIAN GREY By BENJAMIN DISRAELI. Condensation by Alice G. Grazier.

Benjamin Disraeli (Lord Beaconsfield), the eldest son of Isaac D'Israeli, was born in London in 1804. Although all the children were born into the Jewish faith, he was a Christian, and he was a member of the House of Commons.

Disraeli died at his home in Cuckoo Lane on the 19th of April, 1881.

Disraeli's story of Vivian Grey, like others of his novels, deals largely with politics, and contains characters who are well known persons of the period.

When Vivian Grey reached the age of five years it was discovered that the education of a doting, pampered and over-indulgent mother had spoiled the child, and it was decided that he should be sent away to school.
