MARY CARR SCORES AGAIN IN "THUNDERCLAP"

Mary Carr, who, because of her splendid portrayal of the mother in "Over the Hill" has come to be recognized as the "great mother," came to the Oakland theatre last night in the William Fox super-photo-play "Thunderclap," billed as the "greatest race track photodrama ever produced."
