Estimated cost at the present time is \$15,000,000.

Robert J. Beals of Detroit, who presented the proposition to the Birmingham Real Estate Board for its endorsement, has been raising the money to guarantee that he will bring out the money.

Almost two decades later, as Detroit and Southfield have begun developing under modern business stimulus, the need of larger banking facilities has become acute.

The First National Bank is organizing a new institution with a capital of \$10,000,000 and began business rather auspiciously by absorbing the million dollar mark, and the directors decided upon the new business step of providing a modern home.

The new banking building that will be thrown open to public inspection next week, is a credit to Birmingham and for years a landmark to the guiding hands which saw trading grow from a country store to the present.

The Village of Birmingham, adopted by the Birmingham Board as an appropriate phrase for the new village, will be illuminated by a number of electric lights, the cost of which will probably be paid by the Village, according to a decision of the Village Board at its meeting Monday night.
