But it looks like a fellow can't do anything here but tend to business. Among those who boast K. P. during the first few days is Private Walker of the 11th Company, who claims that he was in suspense for a few hours the first morning after arriving, because he had been "called" the night before for wrestling in line with a red-headed boy. He remarked to his companions that he did not know whether he was to be shot or sent home but later reported to them that the worst consisted of cleaning out a drinking tank with the red-headed boy and as he was a good sport, it wasn't so bad as it might have been.

WILLIAM BRISTOL REAGHES
NINETY-FIRST MILESTONE
Is Still Active; Walked Six Miles On Last Birthday; Came Here In 1846

Where some speak from the fond and hazardous fables of Oakland County in 1846, to the present luxurious reaches of asphalt pavement, including meetings with the noise of thrubbing automobile motors, William Bristol, 91 years old on July 21, 1921, a witness to this phenomenal progress of civilization. A familiar figure in the history of Oakland county, Mr. Bristol is one of the stable pioneers of the district. For more than ten years he was active in the offices of supervisor of Southfield township and tax collector. A staunch Republican in his youthful days, Mr. Bristol still believes that his "party principles" are the salvation of the United States. His first vote was cast in 1846, when his choice of President was John Tyler, who died a year ago and is buried in the Frankston cemetery. Mr. Bristol lives with his son, Ezra, in Southfield.
