 Mr. Leigh Lynch, who was elected at the annual meeting as trustee for one year, appeared and qualified.

The following organization of the Board of Education for the school year 1921-1922 was then effected: President, H. B. Clement; Secretary, Roy J. Taylor; Treasurer, J. H. McBride; Trustee, R. J. Coryell; Trustee, Leigh Lynch.

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Education for the school year 1921-1922 was set at 8 P. M. on the last Monday of each month. The resignation of Mrs. Bertha Penwarden as kindergarten teacher was received and accepted.

Mr. Leigh Lynch was appointed to serve on the Lecture Course Committee.

Moved by Taylor, seconded by McBride, that the following rates be charged for tuition by School District No. 1, Ft. Bloomfield, for the school year 1921-1922. Carried.

ZACHARIAS HOMESTEAD SOLD

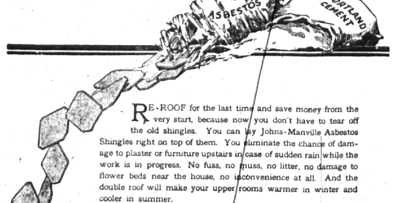

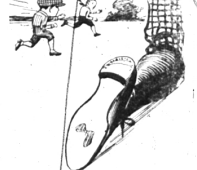
