

turn she needs a doctor's superior knowledge which enables him to make a positive diagnosis. It takes four days to send a culture to Lansing and get a report. Back. A doctor could make such an examination in a few hours.

"I wonder if we will be able to give our kiddies who are more than 10% underweight a glass of milk and crackers during the school hours next year? Many of our children are underweight, and undernourished and need special attention. Again it is impossible to do good nutritional work without a doctor's help.

"What is ahead of us? Let us all work together for healthy happy children and whatever the future may be we shall not need to fear."
