"Come on, Reggie," she muttered. "Help me get her out of this. We'll go."

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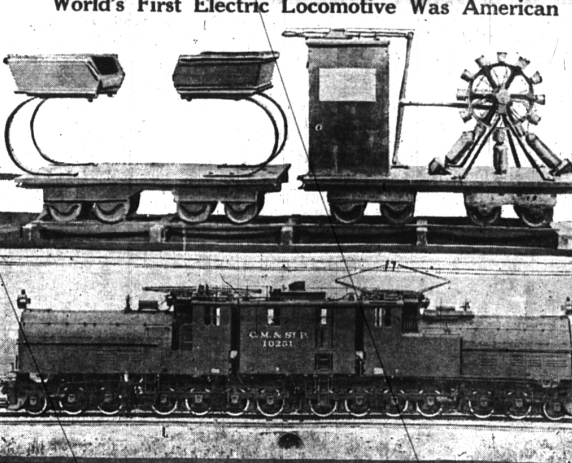

World's First Electric Locomotive Was American



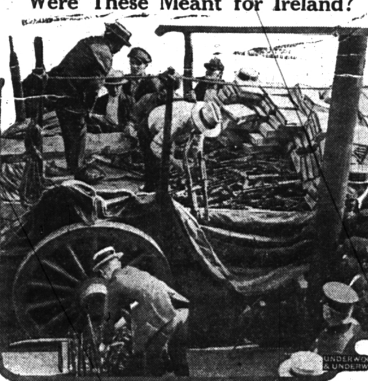

Were These Meant for Ireland?



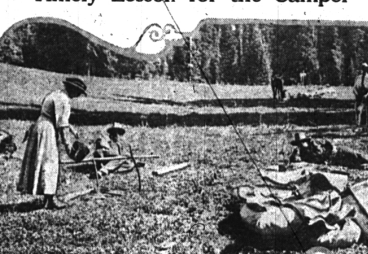
