16 LOCAL BOYS LEAVE JULY 21 FOR CAMP GRANT
Will Be Given Military Training Under U. S. Regular Officers; Major Hewitt in Charge of Local Work

Major R. B. Hewitt, local chairman of the Officers' Reserve Camp work in this community, has been supervising the vaccinating of the 16 local boys, during the past three weeks. The boys will go to Camp Grant, Ill., this summer for the training that the United States government is offering free to men between the ages of 16 and 35 years of age. The local boys will have undergone three vaccinations before they are ready for the trip on July 21. Camp this year is for a period of four weeks. If the boys desire they may enter the camp the following two years, and so become members of the Organized Reserves through their ability to adapt themselves to military life.

As the National Army divisions in the World War began with No. 76, the Organized Reserve divisions will carry the same numerical designations from No. 76 upward, and their organization presages activity for the members of the Officers' Reserve Corps in the various areas, for these officers will be called upon to assist in recruiting the divisions up to strength, which is placed at approximately 15,000 officers and men a division. The division will comprise two infantry brigades of two regiments each, a Field Artillery brigade of two regiments, together with the necessary Engineer, Signal Corps, Train and other troops. As the plan for the Organized Reserves calls for trained men, the veterans of the World War will be urged to enroll, and it is hoped to gain many recruits from among the men who will attend the civilian military training camps this summer.

CHURCH OFFERS RESOLUTION TO PRESIDENT HARDING

The following resolution was voted on by the congregation of the Methodist Episcopal church of Birmingham, last Sunday morning and signed by the pastor and the chairman of the board of trustees. It was forwarded to the representative of this district in congress, Hon. Patrick H. Kelly, and to Senators Townsend and Newberry. The resolution came after the preaching by the pastor of a sermon entitled "Do We Want Another World War?"

"We favor and recommend that the Government of the United States, through its President, Warren G. Harding, to take the initiative in inviting an international conference to be held in the United States, to confer upon the question of international reduction of armaments. "We believe that such an invitation not only would meet with the favor and response of the leading nations of the world, but that such a step would go far toward restoring to the United States the moral leadership of the world."
