BIRMINGHAM BOYS INVITED TO ATTEND SUMMER CAMP

It was announced this week by Major Richard B. Hewitt of Oakland avenue, that boys between the ages of 16 and 32 years in the village wishing for information concerning one of the Citizens' Military Training Camps could communicate with him.

This is an exceptional opportunity for young men to have a four weeks' outing, camp life, physical development through out-of-door games and sports; expert and individual medical attention; removal of any minor bodily defects; social recreation, lectures, vaudeville, moving pictures, amateur and dramatic musical entertainment and voluntary religious exercises for men of all faiths.

For many of the local boys this plan will solve the summer vacation problem. Camp opens July 21 and closes August 21. The government will pay the full expenses of transportation, subsistence, quarters, uniforms, equipment, laundry service, medical and dental care.
