COMMISSION DISCUSSES ANNEXATION POSSIBILITY

Birmingham Park and Quorum Lakes Estates Seek Admission To Village

The possibility of the annexation of Birmingham Park and Quorum Lakes Estates, was freely discussed by President Clize and Commissioners Schlenck and Brown at the meeting of the Village Commission last Monday night. According to information set forth by President Clize, the taking of Birmingham Park and Quorum Lakes into the Village, would be a good thing for Birmingham provided that both the outlying districts and the Village would be required to meet the same standards for disposal facilities.

President Clize stated that Mr. Hendrie had secured approximately 300 acres of land lying in the course of the River Rouge, which Birmingham had purchased for the purpose of a park on one end, the other being used for a sewer filtering basin.

It appears that this same proposition came up several years ago, when Commissioner Brown was then a member of the Village Commission.
