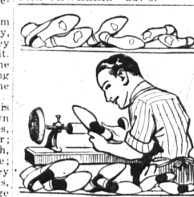
The children of the Hill and Barnum schools will appear in the operetta, "The Cruise of the Ruddle..."

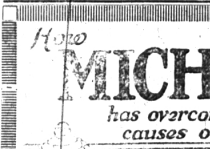
"We do not hope to develop any big league timber, but we do hope to develop into the first team within the next few weeks," said Mr. Taylor this week when discussing the new venture. "The outlook for a first team is much better now than two weeks ago when we played our first game against the Tripoli N. Smith O.C. team, from Detroit. We defeated them 5-2."

The second game the new team played this season was Saturday, May 14, on Barnum field, when they played the Orientals from Detroit. This contest ended with a tie. The score was 6 and 6 in the last inning and was called on account of the late hour.

The Birmingham baseball team is made up of the following well known Birmingham men: Arthur Baynes, catcher; James Baynes, pitcher; Waters, pitcher; Lloyd Smith, pitcher; George Johnson, 1st base; "Buddy" Morrow, 2nd base; Stanley Anderson, shortstop; Mike Groves, 3rd base; Walter left field; George Anderson, center field; and Luccombe, right field.

"This is the team as it is today," said Mr. Taylor, "but we hope before the summer is over to add some of our well known players who have returned out for practice so far."

Practices are held every Tuesday, Thursday and Friday evening. The next game will be played Saturday, May 21, at 3 o'clock. The home team will meet the Tripoli All-Stars from Detroit. The following Saturday, May 28, Royal Oak will try its hand with the local team. The balance of the games this season will be played on the Barnum field, until July 2, when they will go to Royal Oak.
