COMMERCIAL DEPARTMENT
The Commercial Department in our school has been greatly developed in the last two years. The courses which have been taught are Bookkeeping, Typewriting, Stenography, Commercial Arithmetic, Commercial Grammar, Commercial Penmanship, Commercial English, and Commercial Dictation. Although commercial geography, commercial arithmetic and penmanship have been taught, the school has for a number of years, the other courses have only begun. Bookkeeping has been taught in the school since September, 1920, typewriting was started the second semester of the same year, while shorthand has only been taught since the beginning of this term. The bookkeeping course is the most important in the school and typing are arranged to cover a period of two years to complete the course.
Because of the many courses given in this department this year, it is necessary to have two instructors. Miss Gray has charge of the bookkeeping, typing, shorthand and commercial penmanship. Miss Gray teaches commercial arithmetic, typing and penmanship. Typing for the various departments in the school is done by the students in the typewriting classes.
Bookkeeping, typewriting and penmanship are a great help to anyone, no matter what he is planning to do when he is through school. These courses give one an insight into business life, therefore one should not take them merely to learn a trade, but bookkeeper or stenographer, but should take them as a stepping stone to something higher. Bookkeeping is also practicable in the home where a budget might be kept of expenses, etc. many of the students more than some
