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## OBITUARY

**William A. Hagerman**  
William A. Hagerman died at his home in Bloomfield Center, Monday morning. Death was caused from his incidental to old age. The funeral services were held from his late home, Wednesday afternoon, at 2:30 o'clock. Burial was in Greenwood cemetery, Birmingham. The deceased was born at Delaware Water Gap, Pa. June 1, 1842. He was the eldest son of John and Adeline Hagerman and came to Michigan in 1863. He was married Nov. 18, 1868, to Eliza Roberts of Bloomfield, who died July 25, 1917. To this union were born three children, Mrs. David A. Brown, Mr. Hagerman and Mrs. William G. Blumberg of Birmingham. The deceased was married Jan. 6, 1909, to Mrs. Hannah J. Wilson, of St. Petersburg, Fla., who with his three children and three grandchildren, survive him. There are also two brothers surviving, Frank A. of Birmingham, and David A. of Houston, Texas.

**Mrs. Marjory Thompson**  
The death of Mrs. Marjory Thompson occurred November 9 in Pasadena, Cal., and has come as a shock to her many Birmingham friends, both in social and artistic life. For eight years Mrs. Thompson lived with her husband, Walter, and three children, Barbara, Jane and Jack, at their country home, "Castover," in Bloomfield Hills. Her health failed her and the family moved to California about a year ago. During her residence in Birmingham Mrs. Thompson had gained wide renown for herself in her work as an artist. She was a member of the Women Painters' Society and the Fine Arts Society of Detroit. Her work had been exhibited with the women painters for several years.

Surviving, besides her immediate family are her father, W. B. Callahan of Chicago, Ill., and a sister, Mrs. Eugene G. O'Brien. The funeral was held at Turner and Stevens Chapels, Pasadena, at 10:30 Saturday morning, Nov. 12.

**Harry Wagner**  
Following an illness of two weeks Harry Wagner died early Wednesday evening from pneumonia. Death occurred at the home of Irving Bailey, 701 Perry street, where Mr. Wagner had roomed since last February. For over two and a half years Mr. Wagner had been an employee of the Douglas Plumbing Co. of Birmingham.
