NEW STATE LAW PROHIBITS PLACARDING TREES ON ROADS
 Oakland County Road Commissioners Warn Against Premicious Advertisement Signs and Safety of Autists and Damage Trees
 Word has just been received relative to the new law passed by the Legislature in relation to placarding of trees, poles and other surfaces that are within the highways of any county in the State. The Road Commissioners, John A. Adams, Thomas Lytle and G. Ross Thompson, have advised that they will rigidly enforce and prosecute all violators of the law. Following are two sections of the new law: Sec. 1. "It shall be unlawful to post, display or otherwise injure any shade or ornamental tree or shrub growing within the limits of any public highway within the State of Michigan without the consent of the authorities having jurisdiction over such road. In the case of a trunk line or federal aided road the State Highway Commissioner shall be deemed to have such jurisdiction in all cases. It shall also be unlawful to affix to any such tree or shrub any picture, announcement, notice or advertisement of any kind, or to attach to any such animal to be down or injure same. Any person violating any of the provisions of this Act shall be deemed to be guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction shall be punished by a fine not more than three hundred dollars or by imprisonment in the county jail for a period not exceeding thirty days, or by both a fine and imprisonment within the discretion of the court."

Fuel Economy Suggestions
 The furnace with a deep fuel bed and deep draft as low as possible to give desired heat. A shallow fuel bed gives poor economy. Cleaners and rakes are necessary. Have dampers installed in smoke pipe between the furnace and chimney and keep them closed. Don't shake your fire too much. Use the poker more and break the fire up. Keep your furnace combustion chamber clean. See that the furnace and pipes are well covered with asbestos. Use hard coal. Bank the fire with ashes at night.
