VILLAGE COMMISSION WATER PLAN MAY BE ONLY ONE TO BE VOTED UPON

Up To Commission To Place Citizens' Proposition On Ballot; To Decide Next Monday

REFER TO ATTORNEY Ninety Days Allowed For Officials To Accept Such Plans, It Said; Up To People Now

The Eccentric last week stated that the people of Birmingham would vote upon two propositions for water works extensions at the annual election on March 13. Unless the Village Commission, at their meeting next Monday night, votes to put the petition of the Citizens' Water Commission on the ballot, there will be only one issue to vote upon, that outlined by the Village Commission itself.

By Matter On Table The petition of the Citizens' Water Commission was presented to the Village Commission Monday night by the Citizens' Water Commission. It has upon it the required number of signatures to carry it to the ballot. It is in the form of a petition, accompanied by the following letter, which is self-explanatory:

Birmingham, Mich., Feb. 20, 1922. The Honorable Commission of the Village of Birmingham, Gentlemen:—The Citizens' Water Commission has prepared a revised proposition in the form of a petition to the commission to the effect of an ordinance to authorize the issue of bonds to the amount of \$750,000 for the purpose of constructing a waterworks system for the Village.

We recognize that under the Village Charter, your honorable body would have the privilege of extending the submission of this proposition up to ninety days in order that the Village might be saved the additional expense of a Special Election and also recognizing that it is with your province to put this up for a vote at the General Election on March 13, 1922.

Thanking you to give this your careful consideration, and trusting that you will recognize the great number of voters by placing it on the ballot, we remain,

Plans For Planting Shade Trees Given

Local Real Estate Board Pledges Co-operation With Village Commission—1,000 TREES IS GOAL

Suggestions from the Birmingham Real Estate Board, in response to an appeal made some weeks ago by the Village Commission to institute a campaign here for the planting of 1,000 trees in the Spring, were read at the meeting of the Commission Monday night. The early adoption of some of the ideas set forth and the co-operation of the two bodies will undoubtedly insure the successful carrying out of the campaign.

Members of the Commission Monday night expressed themselves pleased with the suggestions received, and said that they would get busy at once to show the people of Birmingham why it was necessary to take part in the planting of trees.

The suggestions of the Real Estate Board's letter: "Inasmuch as all trees to be planted here should be planted according to certain type, and should be planted in rows, and should be spaced a number of feet apart, and must be planted according to other requirements of the Village Commission, the planting of the thousand trees here done under the direction of the proper authorities."

"We respectfully suggest that the Village Commission, at this time, arrange for the appointment of a village forester, as a permanent advisory position, that the beautiful trees of our city be planted in an intelligent and properly for all time."

The Birmingham Real Estate Board will pledge the help of its members to do all that it can to legislate for the appointment of a village forester, if the Commission will permit printed upon which applications may be made by a landowner, our board will undertake to get as many signers as possible on these applications.

"If your honorable body desires to go into the tree matter more fully, a plan for the appointment of a village forester more than glad to co-operate with you in working out the details."
