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INTERURBAN CARS ON NEW SCHEDULE IN CITY OF DETROIT

Because of the consolidation of the 10 and 14 A. M. routes on Woodlawn avenue within the city of Detroit a new method of operating interurban cars along that street is now being effected by applying to cars of the Flint and Pontiac divisions. These cars now do a strictly interurban business and do not pick up strictly city passengers. In order to put an equal division of city service to the benefit of the city and company lines it was necessary to move the interurban fare inside the city to the level of a strictly city passenger fare, and to carry passengers from points outside of the city service zone.

Optional after leaving the Detroit interurban station these cars stop only to take on interurban passengers while enroute they stop only to pick up passengers outside of the city. Outside the city and interurban fare will be paid at the same time by having the car stop at the city transfer point where the interurban fare must be paid to the city. Mr. Bond and then within a few minutes make for the 22 mile zone to permit passengers to change cars to leave the interurban and board any regular Woodlawn line car. The interurban fares of fare paid for more the Greater and for the 22 miles zone. The fare for the 22 miles zone transferred to the interurban fare has been paid for a distance of 22 miles from Detroit, Pontiac and Royal Oak.

170 SCHOOL CHILDREN ARE BEING SERVED MILK DAILY

According to Mrs. R. B. Hewitt, president of the Child Conservation League of Birmingham, which is serving milk in the local schools, 170 children are being served with a quart of milk daily. Each child is given a daily pint in the form of a glass of milk with a little sugar. The school trustees of the Methodist Episcopal church of Birmingham have been asked to allow the League to erect a milk house in the school grounds, however, any kind of the grade school is provided to take it from Mrs. Hewitt.
