plant for a stationary gasoline engine? Had you taken anybody where the gasoline engine would get any water to pump unless the storage tanks is used, and if the tank is going to stay why not the steam pump?

The storage tank works perfectly, they pump in and out of it at the same time when they want to for any reason, and when fire occurs they open an eight inch valve and in two minutes three two-hundred-fifty gallon streams at 60 lbs. may be turned on a fire. Another big well and we will put five streams on a fire. We have never used but two streams.

In a little more than a year they have been compelled under the emergency act to build three 12-in. wells, repair the engines and boilers and build a \$10,000 storage tank for fire protection and sprinkling. They have about \$11,000 of notes against the water fund (including cost of tanks) and about \$1500 against the street fund, while they have nearly \$7,000 cash in the general fund.

Last year every fund had a deficit and they had as many notes as they have now. They are much better off and they reduced the tax from \$15 to \$14.50 per thousand.

Who would like to increase the summer tax if unnecessary, while the winter tax is over \$30 per thousand. If good business methods are used the village tax can be kept down and we have everything desired.
There is no time to lose if we are to have a big well east of Woodward Avenue in running order by May this year. Who doesn't want a big well down by the high school this summer? Does anybody think there never can be another addition to the water supply when it is needed? "\$39,000.00, YES," means water this summer.


