To the Qualified Electors of the Township of Bloomfield (Precincts 1, 2, 3 and 4) County of Oakland, State of Michigan. Notice is hereby given that the next special Township Election will be held at the FARMER CENTER and HAYTER SCHOOL, on TUESDAY, AUGUST 15th, 1922.

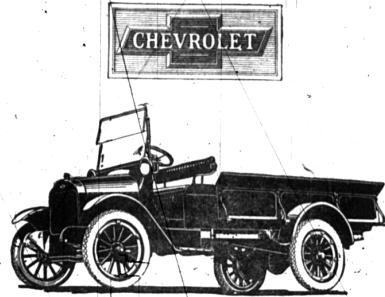
That the question of the addition of certain territories taken from the Township of Bloomfield to the Village of Birmingham, as created for the position of Fred V. Quarten and others, now on file in the records of this Board, be submitted to the qualified electors residing in the district to be affected by said addition of territory, and that the territories interested in the said addition be held in said election on August 15th, 1922.

Sec. 1. On the day of any election the polls shall be opened at seven o'clock in the forenoon, or as soon thereafter as the polls shall be continued open until five o'clock in the afternoon and no longer. FIFTEEN days prior to the election and published within the township the board of inspectors of electors may, by their direction, adjourn the polls at twelve o'clock noon, for one hour, and may also provide that the polls shall be open not later than eight o'clock P. M. of said day of election, and the Board of Election Inspectors, in their discretion, adjourn the polls at 12 o'clock noon for one hour.

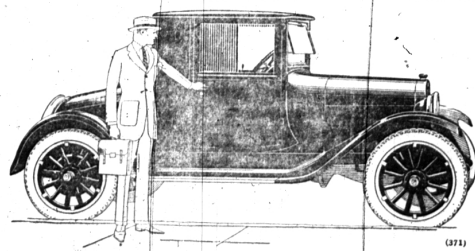
