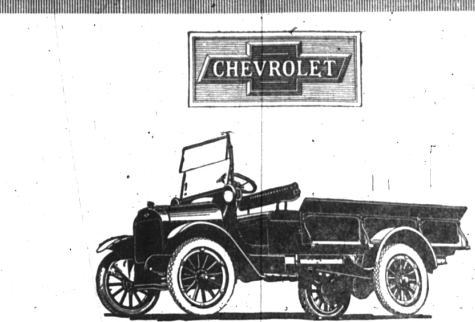
Mr. and Mrs. F. E. Van Black, of East Maple avenue, will leave Birmingham about June 15 to spend the summer and fall in a tour of California.
