



## Chicago's "Ponzi" Gathers in Millions





## Fire on the Roof of Uncle Sam's Treasury





### TICK ERADICATION IN SOUTH

Work Has Progressed Satisfactorily in Georgia Where There Has Been Co-Operation.

Tick eradication has progressed satisfactorily in Georgia, where there have been co-operation of the State and Federal authorities. In the past few months 4,000 head of cattle have been vaccinated, and the State Department of Agriculture, according to a report just issued by the United States Department of Agriculture, during June 314,562 dippings of cattle were officially supervised in the State, and in the control exercised in the eradication of ticks.

With the exception of one county, Taylor, there has been hearty co-operation in carrying on the tick eradication work. The commissioners' court of Taylor county declined to co-operate.

ate with the State for the enforcement of dipping and quarantine regulations, and has refused to complete the work of tick eradication in herds on private farms and in localities held under local quarantine at the time the Federal quarantine was revised in December, 1920. For this reason it has been necessary to re-quarantine Taylor county.

There is in effect in Georgia a State regulation which provides that all cattle going through the tick eradication work be marked with paint at each dipping. This regulation has been of great assistance in facilitating tick eradication. Range riders, whose duty it is to pick up any cattle not marked with paint, are employed in each county. Undipped cattle are taken to the dipping vat and dipped at the expense of the owner, or if the owner cannot be found, they are treated as strays and sold for the expenses incurred in their gathering and dipping. To this system, the Department of Agriculture attributes the satisfactory results in ridding the State of ticks. In fact, it is said there are fewer undipped cattle in Georgia, in counties in which tick eradication is being carried on, than in any other State.

The importance of freeing the South of ticks is emphasized by the increase in the number of markets which are being closed to ticks. Markets are being closed to ticks in Maryland, Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Utah, Virginia, Washington, West Virginia, Wisconsin and Wyoming.

Most of the mileage thus approved embraces graded earth, and clay and gravel roads. Of these types of road, the Government approved projects totaling 1,044.7 miles. The cost of constructing these roads, comparatively small, will total \$10,048,267. It is estimated that that sum a total of \$4,883,955.62 has been allotted from Federal aid funds.

### HORSE MUST HAVE EXERCISE

To Maintain Normal Health and Strength He Should Be Kept Outside During Winter.

The horse cannot maintain his normal health and strength unless he exercises as he would obtain in traveling from five to six miles a day. To obtain this he should be kept outside as much as possible during the winter months and be housed in a cool, well-ventilated barn, properly bedded.

### MARKETING SURPLUS GRAINS

Many Farmers Tempted to Use Supply of Feed for the Purpose of Producing Beef.

Cheap feed and relatively low prices for feeders are tempting many to turn surplus roughage and feed into beef. This course offers one of the most attractive ways of marketing certain grains and coarse feeds. It is important that one buys his feeders at a reasonably low figure.

Prevent Loss in Lambs.

You will take a loss of from 25 cents to \$1 a head if you do not dock your lambs. Do the work when the lambs are a few days old; and castrate the lambs at the same time.

Grazing for Hogs.

A succession of pasture crops for hogs will be necessary on many farms if hogs are to be raised economically.

Evex Need Plenty Room.

### APPROVE HIGHWAY PROJECTS

Funds Aggregating \$10,389,516.68 Allotted Toward Construction of Public Roads.


Construction of public roads continues rapidly. During the first quarter of the current fiscal year, or the three months ending September 30, highway projects in 38 States were approved and Federal aid funds aggregating \$10,389,516.68 were allotted toward their construction by the Bureau of Public Roads, United States Department of Agriculture. Additional projects have been approved since September 30 and others are under consideration.

The length of the projects approved during the three months is 1,400 miles, exclusive of a number of important bridges which, when constructed, will measure slightly more than two miles in length, all told. Total cost of the approved projects is estimated at \$25,253,849.30; total cost of the bridges at \$1,478,146.77. Of this sum the States will pay about \$16,500,000, or more than three-fifths of the total.

Up to the beginning of the current fiscal year the Department has approved projects totaling 25,402 miles in length, costing approximately \$27,123,242. Of the total cost of \$27,123,242 the Federal aid funds have been allotted to the extent of \$20,274,414.74. The foregoing figures cover mileage and cost of all roads approved by the Department since the inception of Federal aid. Considering the allotments of aid year, the Department has approved, from the inception of Federal aid to September 30 last, roads totaling 26,492 miles in length and costing \$28,164,124. Toward their construction the Federal Government has allotted a grand total of \$21,153,931, or more than 34 per cent.

Projects approved during the three months ending September 30 are located in Alabama, Arizona, Arkansas, California, Colorado, Florida, Georgia, Idaho, Indiana, Kansas, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, Mississippi, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, New Hampshire, New Mexico, New York, North Dakota, Ohio, Oklahoma, Oregon, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas, Utah, Virginia, Washington, West Virginia, Wisconsin and Wyoming.


