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Unlimited Capital Now Available Here For Building Loans

First State Bank Now Ready To Offer Loans Of From \$2,000 To \$5,000

FOR RESIDENCES ONLY

Local First National Bank Also Arranging For Similar Proposition For Its Patrons

Unlimited capital for the advancement of building construction within the confines of Birmingham is now available through the First State Savings Bank, according to an announcement made Thursday by Thomas H. Cobb, vice-president and cashier.

Through the efforts of Mr. Cobb, his wife and Mr. H. C. Clark, of the Union Trust Company of Detroit, the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company has agreed to guarantee the world, which will loan the money, as the local sub-agent for Birmingham.

"The amount of money allotted to Birmingham is unlimited," stated Mr. Cobb, "and it is available for the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company, which will loan the money, as the local sub-agent for Birmingham."

According to Mr. Cobb, payments on all loans are made at the rate of 6 per cent, and the principal, with all interest on remaining principle, payable semi-annually on the first of January and July. No money is available for outside property.

Village Commission To Ask People To Approve \$60,000 Bond Issue For New Wells

TWO UNITS AND TANK

Gravel Wall Or Other Two Wells, New Mains and Elevated Steel Tank On The Ballot

After many weeks of thoughtful research and investigation into the price of extending and increasing the water works system of the Village of Birmingham, members of the Village Commission, Monday night announced that they had reached a decision in the matter, and set Monday, May 29, as the date for a special election to be held, at which time the qualified electors will have the chance to vote on the proposed bonds.

The amount of approximately \$60,000, to be used for the purchase and installation of 3,000 feet of water main extensions, costing approximately \$100,000, will also be on the ballot at this election.

Commissioner Brown and Bell are confident that the people of Birmingham, tired of "scrapping" about local matters, would place their stamp of approval on the issue at the polls May 29.

According to the plans and specifications on file in the Village Clerk's office, the contemplated project calls for the installation of two new main lines, 300 or more feet in diameter, capable of delivering 500 or more gallons of water per minute.

Members of the present, as well as past, of the Y. M. C. A. have placed emphasis on the need for these additional mains, and it is hoped that the people of Birmingham will adopt the plan on May 29.

Saturday, May 20, has been set as the day for registration for this special election. All persons who are not registered are asked to go to the office of the Village Clerk to place their names on the books, in order to be eligible to vote May 29.

SEWER BONDS SOLD AT PAR THIS WEEK

Good Work Of Commission Results In Saving Of Several Thousands Of Dollars

Splendid and diligent work on the part of the Village Commission and the Village Attorney, Village Auditor and the Village Clerk, in the saving of the sale of sewer bonds to the Central Savings Bank of Detroit this week, has resulted in the saving of several thousands of dollars to the Village treasury.

These bonds, amounting to \$25,000, were sold at par under par, were received by the Commission over a month ago, but were refused.

These bonds, issued to cover part of the expense of laying over three miles of sewers in the Village, have been in the hands of the Commission for some time. The Village Auditor, in the saving of the sale of the bonds, covered in the levying of taxes in special assessment districts, has been paid into the Village treasury, later to be turned over to the contractors doing the work.

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
