With the present burden of taxation that we have to bear, do the taxpayers approve of a \$45,000 per year salary list for the sheriff's office in Oakland County? This does not include the road wagon. Do you think it necessary? Do you think it necessary to have two turnkeys at the sheriff's office?

The present administration has an engineer at \$1,800 per year and a janitor at \$1,200 per year. Any janitor with second class papers can run the boiler at \$1,600 per year. I know of many men who would be glad to keep the books at the county jail and act as turnkey also. We also have more deputies on a salary than necessary. Ferndale, Royal Oak, Birmingham and Pontiac have a good police force, and the sheriff's force is not called upon in these various cities, only in emergencies. At present seventeen officers are on the salary list of the sheriff's force, not including the janitor, engineer, cook, matron, bookkeeper and two deputies on the road wagon. Do you think it necessary to have all this raft at the expense of the taxpayers of Oakland County? I say it is not and stand ready to prove it if given the opportunity. You will notice in the record of the present administration that the majority of arrests have been for drunkenness and liquor law violations. There is a cause for all evil and the cause for this particular evil lies within the county. The best remedy for all diseases is to remove the cause. I will remove the cause of drunkenness if given the opportunity. Each succeeding year a political machine in Oakland County puts its man across and each year it costs the taxpayers more. Why not try a man just once who does not belong to the machine, or more commonly called ring, and see if you don't get better results?
