Woman's Party Makes Long Investigation Of Rights In Michigan

MAKE WOMEN "PEOPLE" Wisconsin Only State In Union That Fully Recognizes Woman's Rights In Law

By Mrs. V. N. Whittemore Michigan women who thought that the law was made for men and not for women, are now surprised to learn that the laws of their state are still very dubious on just that question.

In fact, according to certain Michigan laws, the National Woman's Party, even today a woman is not quite a person if she is a mother of a wife. A single woman in Michigan has practically all the rights a man has, but as soon as she marries she immediately loses certain of these rights.

Michigan, the report points out, is by no means the most backward of the states in regard to its attitude toward women. Two years after the passage of the suffrage amendment, it was the first to give women the right to serve on juries.
