WE HEARD IT SAID BY—

W. S. McAlpine, maker of Oakland County maps: "There are many men willing to devote their time gathering specimens and information of any subject related to natural history, if only they could make a living at the task. But unfortunately there is not enough money available to museums to keep trained men continuously at such research. In order to get the public interested in financing a museum, it is necessary to make a miscellaneous collection of objects that delight the eye but are almost of no value for practical purposes. What is needed is a complete collection of specimens and data on the life history of each plant, animal or insect, arranged and catalogued so that anyone in search of information may be able to find out all he wishes in one place. The museum would thus be an authority and would be as invaluable as any school or hospital."

Homer Gaskill, police captain: "For a number of years I was employed on the Chicago traction line and I have seen nothing that has impressed me in the way of rapid work quite so much as the system of monorails proposed some time ago for Detroit and suburbs. To me monorails appear practical and serviceable as it does not require the amount of structural work that an ordinary street car would be extended to areas where it would be impractical to build tracks of regular width. Something of this kind is certainly needed in these towns near Detroit."

Clarence Vilet, Superintendent of Public Schools: "The average cost to the taxpayers of this school district for each and every pupil that comes into the district is between six and eight hundred dollars. This amount of money, of course, goes toward the erecting of the structure of new school buildings, equipment, etc."

Mrs. Lee White, Brookside avenue: "It is earnestly desired by the Birmingham branch of the Michigan League that the Chicago traction line course that they are sponsoring will meet with enthusiastic support from all students attending in Birmingham, but throughout Oakland County. The cultural and educational value of the work appears only to those who are working for credits, but to those who wish to keep an rapport with the latest developments in either of these subjects."

J. H. McBride, Village President: "I certainly hope that the local branch of the Child Conservation League of America will resume the dispensing of milk in the local schools this fall. The work they did last year was of inestimable value to the health of the local children and should be encouraged by every resident of the district. It is a worthy cause and the women who carried it through last year should be greatly applauded for their efforts."

A. D. B. Van Zandt, of Dewey street: "The question of allowing more curb gas filling stations should be put up to a vote of the people. It is pretty hard for a Commission of three men to arbitrarily settle a question in Birmingham, lest they appear to be discriminating. Why not let the people decide the question at the annual election next spring?"

GASKILL DOES CLEVER WORK AS SLEUTH HERE

Causes Arrest Of Man Claimed To Have Defrauded New Jersey Widow Of \$4,700

Frank Leighton, alias Frank Layton, Frank Myers and Frank Applegate, a former tree trimmer in Birmingham, was arrested in Detroit the latter part of last week, charged with forgery and having absconded with \$4,700 belonging to a widow in Trenton, New Jersey. This is the result of a bit of shrewd detective work on the part of Homer Gaskill, captain of local police.

One day last July Captain Gaskill received a message from Charles W. Wright, a Pinkerton detective in Trenton, asking him to locate a certain Frank Leighton who had come to Birmingham in the first of this year. At first the search was unavailing, though it was discovered that Leighton had formerly been employed by the local village commission to trim trees, and that he had kept company with young lady in Birmingham. Efforts failing to discover the whereabouts of the man through the city process in the case was at a standstill until a chance inquiry led to the discovery that Leighton had last been heard of as a tree trimmer in Detroit. By calling the Detroit police department Captain Gaskill learned that the man was employed in trimming trees on Belle Isle.
