VOTE "NO" OCTOBER 4 The proposed well and high tank to supply all Birmingham is to be on "the east side." Therefore the water must pass through the six-inch mains in East Maple and Oakland Avenues into the eight and ten-inch mains on Woodward and West Maple to serve the west side. This is like trying to fill a garden hose through the rubber tube of the baby's milk bottle. It cannot be done.
