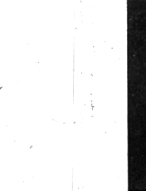

LONG THOUGHT DEAD: SOLDIER COMES HOME
Roy Bailey of Chicago, Reported Dead, Beats Germans At Their Own Game

Miss Florence Bailey of Chicago, who was a girl friend of Roy Bailey, the soldier reported dead, who was a member of the United States Army, and who was in the world war, is the mother of Roy Bailey. In the fall of 1917, when the war was raging hottest, Roy was received by her parents that he had been killed in action. The War Department confirmed the statement that her brother Roy, then 25 years old, was killed in action. The Bailey household was very sad, for the soldier's body was buried with many soldiers on the field of battle in France.

At Christmas time that year the Bailey household was sadly preparing for festival time—the knowledge that their son would never be with them again filling them with anything but joyousness.

Packages were coming each day through the mail—gifts of remembrance from their many friends. But the postman one day brought a letter which the pastmaster of the house. It was a letter from Roy—long believed dead, stating that he was very much better and was ready to get on the battles through which he had gone. Within a few months he was safely home, bringing happiness to a darkened home.

1. Call for partial redemption of 4 1/2 per cent Victory notes:
All 4 1/2 per cent Victory notes, otherwise known as United States of America gold notes of 1922-1923, which bear the distinguishing letters A, B, C, D, E, or F, prefixed to their serial numbers, having been designated for the purpose but not in the manner prescribed by the Secretary of the Treasury are called for redemption on December 15, 1922, pursuant to the provision for redemption contained in the notes and in Treasury Department circular No. 138 dated April 21, 1919, under which the notes were originally issued.
