First stages so the child may be isolated if necessary from his school mates at the earliest possible moment, thus limiting the development of epidemics.



At time permits and again with the consent of the parents vaccination against smallpox and inoculation with the toxin antitoxin prophylaxis against diphtheria will be carried out.

We have at present no reason to believe that the children of Birmingham are healthier or more free from physical defects than are children in other communities.
