Minutes of the previous meeting approved as printed.

112—Moved by President McBride that the Commission authorize Fred Quanton to act as corrected description of the unimproved and indefinitely described parcels of land in the Village, for tax purposes. Yeas, 3; Nays, 0.

113—Moved by President McBride that we borrow \$500 to be credited to the General Fund and \$500 to be credited to the Street Fund, from the First National Bank this day. Yeas, 3; Nays, 0.

114—Moved by Commissioner Birmingham that the bills and pay roll be read and approved. Birmingham Garage, \$20.00; Detroit United Electric, \$24.00; Detroit Electric Co., \$25.25; T. D. 116—Moved by President McBride that the following resolution be accepted and adopted: WHEREAS a "Stipulation" of settlement and discontinuance of appeal in the circuit court of the County of Oakland in the case of the Village of Birmingham vs. Alexander and Susanna Gray, in case No. 12524, and Village of Birmingham vs. Charles S. Newman, in case No. 12525, has been entered into by the parties, and WHEREAS the said stipulation provides for the payment to the defendants in each case the sum of \$100.00.

WHEREAS it appears in said stipulation that the payment to the defendants in each case shall be made in full on the 15th day of May next, and WHEREAS the right of way covering the extension of Hervey street, as set forth and judgment in Justice Court in the Village of Birmingham.

RESOLVED that this Commission hereby determine that it is expedient and advisable that a 6 inch lateral sanitary sewer, with brick manhole and special assessment, be constructed beneath the surface of Ridgeland Avenue, from North Street to Lawrence Avenue, more particularly described as follows:

Beginning at a manhole at the intersection of Ridgeland Avenue and North Street, and extending West 150 feet to a manhole near Lawrence Avenue.

Be it further resolved that all the lots and parcels of land fronting and abutting on said street above described will be benefited by said improvement and shall constitute a special assessment district, upon which a special assessment shall be levied to defray a portion of the expense of constructing said sewer, manholes, and house connections.

Be it further resolved that the Village of Birmingham shall bear 1/6 of the cost of said lateral sanitary sewer and that the lots and parcels of land embraced in said special assessment district shall be assessed 5/6 of the cost of the said sewer and the full cost of house connections of said improvement, according to the benefit derived therefrom, at the time the special assessment shall be divided into installments.

Be it further resolved that the Village Manager shall cause to be prepared and submitted to this Commission for its approval, a map and diagram of said lands and premises constituting said special assessment district, showing the boundaries and division of all lands and premises, and the proposed route and location of the sewer through the same with its proposed depth, grade, dimensions and all details together with an estimate of the cost and expense of constructing said sewer, manholes and house connections and appurtenances.

First Resolution on Knox St. Sanitary Sewer. RESOLVED that this Commission hereby determine that it is expedient and advisable that a 6 inch lateral sanitary sewer, with brick manhole and special assessment, be constructed beneath the surface of Knox Street, from North Street to Poppleton Avenue, with 6 inch extensions on Knox Street, more particularly described as follows:

Beginning at a manhole at the intersection of Knox Street and North Street, extending North to a manhole on Poppleton Avenue, from the point the said sewer extending north on Poppleton Avenue a distance of 125 feet to a lamp pole on Poppleton Avenue, and a 6 inch connection extending west 150 feet to a lamp pole on Knox Street.

Be it further resolved that all the lots and parcels of land fronting and abutting on said street above described will be benefited by said improvement and shall constitute a special assessment district, upon which a special assessment shall be levied to defray a portion of the expense of constructing said sewer, manholes, and house connections.

Be it further resolved that the Village of Birmingham shall bear 1/6 of the cost of said lateral sanitary sewer and that the lots and parcels of land embraced in said special assessment district shall be assessed 5/6 of the cost of the said sewer and the full cost of house connections of said improvement, according to the benefit derived therefrom, and that the special assessment shall be divided into installments.
