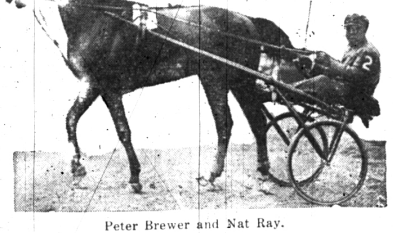


Light and Dark of the Moon. The 22nd of the moon is the time from new moon to full moon, and the dark of the moon is from full moon to new moon, or through the waning period.
