GROESBECK TELLS SEVERAL THINGS ABOUT WOODWARD
(Continued from Page One.)
Woodward Avenue was at its greatest heat. I was not interested in Woodward Avenue in any pecuniary way, but, as Governor of the State, I was deeply interested in the matter of good roads. People become bad-natured when they have to travel over such a road as the present Woodward Avenue. That is bad for the state. \$40, thousands of dollars are lost every day between Saginaw, Flint, Pontiac, and Detroit because motorists must often proceed at a slow pace; it costs money to run an automobile at, but ten miles an hour, you know.
"So you can see that I am in favor of a 200-foot right-of-way for Woodward Avenue. Of course, we do not intend to pave this entire width at once, but we shall have to do so some time and we can just as well secure the correct width of right-of-way. We must not make the mistake that Detroit has made with the new Belle Isle bridge. I venture to say that, within a year, the new bridge will be but half as large as it

should have been to care for traffic conditions.
"I can think of a wider Woodward Avenue without thinking of the Grand Trunk Railway," and here Governor Groesbeck struck the table with his hand, upsetting a glass of water, while every man in the audience strained his ears to catch the words. "I have taken this matter up with the railroad's officials and they seem not adverse to moving their tracks westward."
From what he continued to say about the Grand Trunk, it appears that the railroad "is not adverse to moving," it evidently wants the state to buy it a new right-of-way and install its tracks thereon. The Governor went on:
"I do not think that the Grand Trunk in the past has treated the people of Michigan fairly, not has it done the things necessary to keep up with the progress of the state. Many years ago the state gave the Grand Trunk's predecessor a charter, making the railroad's property exempt from taxation with the exception of a charge of one per cent on all the capital stock investment. But the Grand Trunk has never lived up to the terms of this charter. I say, without fear of successful contradiction, that the Grand Trunk today owes the state of Michigan enough money in taxes which it has evaded to build four wider Woodward Avenues! I do not think it is unfair or too much to ask the Grand Trunk Railroad to move its tracks on to a new right-of-way at its own expense. The state of Michigan has no money now to build a new system of tracks for the Grand Trunk. This railroad certainly needs new tracks and the quicker it moves off Woodward Avenue the quicker we'll see the 200-foot thoroughfare."
"I am not in favor of overhead crossings along Woodward Avenue for the convenience of the railway. We want no heavy taxation burdens on the people. If we take this project in easy stages we can widen Woodward Avenue any hardship on anyone. We have had excellent help from the property owners along the way; the fine spirit they have shown has made it easy for us so far. If your problem and mine to finish the widening of Woodward Avenue as soon as possible. We want to put, as many concrete mixers on the job as possible. We want to start at the city of Pontiac and shoot south, at the same time going north from the Eight-Mile Road. We want to go! We want to shove it through! It has been talked of for so long that there are no 'knockers' left."
Preceding Governor Groesbeck on the program were Harvey S. Campbell, secretary of the Detroit Bureau of Commerce, and Lee H. Bierce, occupying a similar position with the Grand Rapids Association of Commerce. The banquet was staged under the direction of T. B. Prickett, secretary of Royal Oak's Chamber of Commerce.
