# The American Legion

Father O'Connor of Cincinnati Assesses Task to Increase Membership of the American Legion.

Father William P. O'Connor of Cincinnati, national chaplain of the American Legion, refuses to admit that the duties of his office are confined to the delivery of an invocation at the Legion national convention.

He was serving time in July 1917, when he became chaplain of an Ohio National Guard organization which later became the one Hundred and Thirty-sixth Field Artillery of the Thirtieth division. He sailed with this organization for France in June, 1918. The ship, before completing the voyage, ran into a German submarine which later was sunk by destroyers.

Father O'Connor served with his organization in the Bavarian sector and later at St. Mihiel, the Meuse-Arzonne and in Belgium. After the armistice he proved his versatility by arranging for the production of "The Passing Show of the A. E. E.," one of the best soldier shows presented overseas.

The national chaplain obtained first-hand information in regard to the feelings of newly returned veterans when he served for a time with national headquarters of the American Red Cross. Later he became pastor of a church in Jamaica, N. Y., and subsequently was transferred to his present charge, the church of St. Vincent de Paul in Cincinnati.

He served as a member of the Legion's national ceremonial committee in 1921, which drew up the ceremonies which have been used by all Legion posts at all stages of religious creeds and dogmas. Father O'Connor has been noted for his marked liberality and tolerance.
