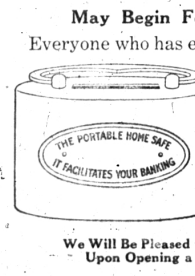

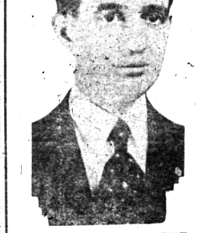
OBITUARY

There are a few dirt farmers, but most of the land is held by non-residents, who naturally are willing that the Village property owners pay the most tax. There is other property improved with mansions and show places, the valuation of which, if properly made would cut Birmingham taxes almost in two.
