Edwards was the real star of the game, caging eight field baskets and four fouls. The other on the B. H. S. team also played what you call "real basket ball."

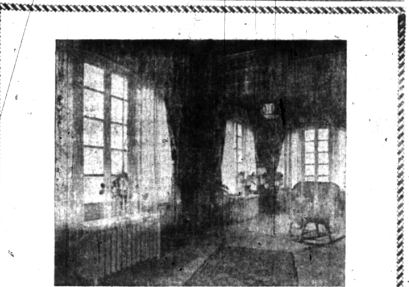
