Library Announces Exquisite Book

Suggests List Of Reading For Warm Weather Perusal

Among the latest additions to the reference collection of the Baldwin Public Library is Stevenson's "Home Book of Verse." It is a collection of poems chosen from the literature of four centuries. The compiler's aim has been to include the best short poems in the English language, and further "to preserve in authentic form certain fugitive poems which everyone admires but which know where to find; and to pay special attention to the works of English and American poets, particularly of the young generation." It is a collection of complete poems, not of fragments from works next to be printed in entirety. The classification for the volume, which the editor says, was made to fit the poems, is as follows: Poems of Youth and Age, Poems of Love, Poems of Nature, Familiar Verse and Poems Humorous and Satiric; Poems of Patriotism, History and Legend, and Poems of Sentiment and Reflection. The book is complete with indexes to authors, titles and first lines. It is a choice volume and is due much appreciation by those people of Birmingham that are lovers of poetry. The following is a specially compiled list of suggested reading: "Boys' Book," Mark Twain, "Roughing It," Duncan, "Dr. Grenfell's Parables," Dunsany, "Unhappy and Proud," Gerolani, "Tramping With a Poet in the Rockies," Hay, "The Lucky Number," "My Discovery of England," McFadden, "Harbor of Memory," Marden, "Sailing South," Muir, "Story of My Boyhood and Youth," Parkman, "Oregon Trail," Robinson, "My Brother Theodore Roosevelt," Sabanti, "Sea and Shore," Stevenson, "Land of Tomorrow," Van Dyke, "Companionable Books."

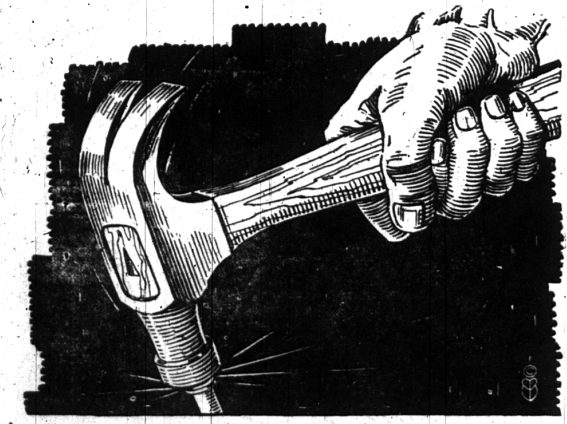
