ORDINANCE NO. 140

The People of the Village of Birmingham

Ordains: Sec. 1. That all persons who shall be or become drunk or intoxicated in any street, alley, shop, store, hotel or other public place within the limits of the Village of Birmingham:

All persons who shall drink, transport or have in their possession any malt, brewed, vinous, fermented, spirituous and intoxicating liquor, in any street, alley, shop, store, hotel or other public place within the limits of the Village of Birmingham:

All persons who have in their possession any gaming table, wheel of fortune, box, machine, instrument or device, or any cards, dice or other gaming device, in any street, alley, shop, store, hotel or other public place within the limits of the Village of Birmingham:

All persons who use any indecent, immoral, obscene, vulgar or insulting language in any street, alley, shop, store, hotel or other public place within the limits of the Village of Birmingham: or shall use such language in the presence of women or children anywhere within the limits of the Village of Birmingham: shall be deemed disorderly persons.

All persons who shall be found guilty under this ordinance shall be punished by a fine not exceeding One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars and costs of prosecution, or by imprisonment in the County Jail not exceeding three months or both such punishment at the discretion of the Court. Year, 3; Nays, 0.
