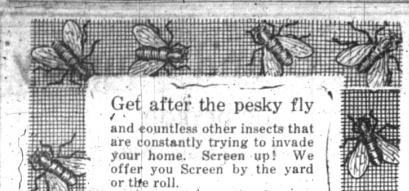

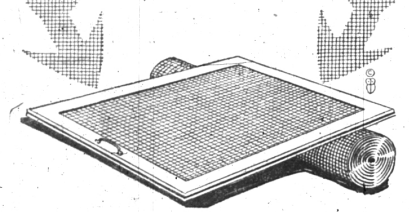

Ford production for the week ending Tuesday, May 22, went to a new high record with a total of 39,417 cars and trucks completed for domestic use, it is announced in the Ford News. This is 114 more than the record-breaking production of the week before. Monday, May 21, was the biggest day of the last week with a production of 6,658 cars and trucks, beating the daily record of 6,615 set up on May 9. Fordson tractor output for the week was 2,936. The Lincoln division of the Ford Motor Co. produced 174 cars during the week ending Tuesday.
