Village Tax Notice

NOTICE is hereby given to all taxpayers in the Village of Birmingham that their annual Village tax will be due and collectible beginning July 1, 1923.

During July there will be no penalty affixed, but between August 1 and August 31, one (1) per cent penalty will be imposed on all taxes collected; from September 1 to October 31 four (4) per cent penalty will be imposed on all taxes collected; the tax roll will be returned to the County Treasurer at Pontiac November 1, after which all taxes will be paid there and an additional two per cent penalty will be imposed for each month or fraction thereof that taxes remain unpaid.
