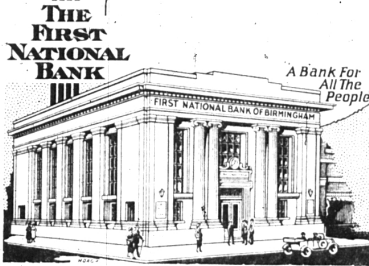

## Theatres

"Mixed Faces" at I. O. F. Temple William Russell will be seen in "Mixed Faces" at the I. O. F. Temple, Saturday, March 24. In this picture, which deals with the intrigue and underhand methods of small town politics, Russell plays a dual role, two types entirely opposite in their character, but exactly alike in appearance.

One of the characters is that of Jimmie Gallop, hustling salesman of the Outwink Fire Extinguisher company, and the other is Judge Granger, candidate for mayor of the town on a "vote for women" and reform ticket.

The theme of the tale is based on the striking resemblance of Jimmie and the judge. The salesman not only causes considerable trouble with the judge's political aspirations, but wins his fiancée as well. How he manages to marry off the town's most promising matrimonial prospect against such a competitor as Judge Granger, provides sufficient action and fun to meet the requirements of the most exacting and fastidious motion picture devotee.

"Hearts Aflame" at the Baldwin Theatre Royal Oak, March 27-28 Realism is the outstanding feature of Reginald Barker's production, "Hearts Aflame," a Metro photoplay which presents Frank Keenan and Anna Q. Nilsson at the head of a

strong cast at the Baldwin Theatre, Royal Oak, next Tuesday and Wednesday. From start to finish the picture is said to carry with it an air of reality and conviction that only sincere effort could produce.

The greatest feat in the picture, and incidentally one of the most daring projects ever attempted for the screen, is the raging forest fire episode which builds up to the powerful climax of the story. Grasping the throttle with one hand and endeavoring to shield his face with the other, the screen actress is plainly seen inside the blazing cab of the engine with the flames from the burning trees reaching out and licking the sides of the locomotive as it plunges through the doomed forest.
