 most important projects in the state of Michigan. Mr. Walsh said, "People do not yet realize the tremendous advantages which will come as a result of this wide highway extending almost 25 miles from Detroit to Pontiac. It will bring Detroit and its thriving suburban communities in closer communication and will be of unquestioned commercial importance. Remember that when this highway is completed it will be a Washington boulevard. Imagine the benefits which are bound to accrue to any district tapped by such a highway as this."

"The Greater Woodward Avenue association," composed of representative owners and real estate operators along this highway, believes that it can render an actual service in co-operating with public officials of this great project upon which actual grading work has been begun."

Mr. Walsh points out that officers of the organization chosen are as representative as possible of the various communities between this city and Pontiac. Familiarity of these men with conditions in their own localities should prove valuable to the state authorities in securing the proper right of way, Mr. Walsh believes.
