Miss Isabel Budley, of Chicago, is the house guest of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Bromley, of Lone Pine Road.

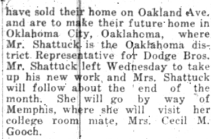
Mr. and Mrs. A. C. McGraw, of North Woodward avenue, entertained as their guest over the week-end, Miss Mary Behring, of Detroit.

## The Child in the Home

How easy it is to fall into a habit does, she never has to do lines after school. "I know teacher gives me manner of speech or some trivial thing—and yet so often we fall into the habit with our theories, which are far from right. When we who are more susceptible are the little ones? They will never see the bright side of it. Just as soon as children are able to take notice and are impressed and because they are so quick to grasp good or bad, it behooves all mothers to turn their flexible minds into the right channels. Some children at an early age form the habit of biting their nails. This is a bad habit apparent from the unsightly appearance it gives to the hands. You will know there is something wrong with the child for on close observation, you will find that he bites his nails only when sitting still, when his mind is active and his body resting.

In this habit, which comes from restlessness or some other cause which is hard to find, is developed because the tips of the fingers hurt. As a Primitive Man did in the Stone Age when he hurt his fingers with a stone hammer or some such weapon, the child will put his finger into his mouth to stop the pain and very soon the habit of biting his nails will be formed. You will notice a child will bite his nails when troubled or excited over some task he is reading or all the "Don't do it" to him at this time will not stop him.

The best plan is to change the mental attitude of the child when you see this nervousness. Another way to keep him from biting his nails is to explain to him that the nails were given us as a protection for the sensitive finger tips and without this protection, the fingers will lose their power of keen touch.

Another bad habit formed by a child is whining. That is something which is very quickly developed and is an established habit before the mother realizes it. It is also very hard to break. First they will start whining about something at school when "I cannot do like Alice Jones

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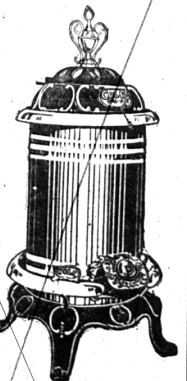
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MISS ELLA BARBOUR
