A week ago last Monday evening in St. Pauls Cathedral, Herbert Hoover, Secretary of Commerce for U. S. A. addressed the first convocation of the National Society for the protection of Child Health. It was Hoover's first address for the majority of his audience which filled the hall to overflowing.

During his short address in which he urged realism instead of idealism he read the "Presidents message. After congratulating the association, Coolidge stated that the only way to accomplish the purpose of the movement was by cooperation of physicians, health officials, and education.

The real address of the evening was delivered by Dr. Cincin of the Rochester Institute. "The American ability to organize," said Dr. Cincin, "has resulted in too many independent groups with more real than knowledge, these only tend to counteract each other and hamper the proper authorities."

Mrs. and Mrs. Mims, sponsor of Townsend street, returned Monday from Otago Lake, where they have been spending the past three weeks.

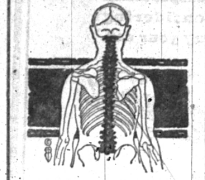
