The Child in The Home

Today I am not giving you any advice, or talks on the training of your children, but I should like to hold your interest by telling you about my children, or rather, our children in Australia.

We have always thought there is nothing of so much value to a country than by paying it back in how our own, so each Mother endeavors to do her utmost for her country through her children. The Australian government pays to every Mother, regardless of position or conditions, the sum of twenty five dollars for every child she has, and in return she gives the child a good education. Everyone naturally comes to the conclusion that population is our only safe guard. And as all loyal citizens wish to have our country in Australia we have not yet prohibited though there was a vote taken on the subject in 1920.

I was at once interested in the welfare of our children, and I was charitably inclined people who are endeavoring to help the masses. The work goes on daily among the very poor, those who are unable to pay their bills, who are nurses in case of illness. There are staff of graduate nurses left in each nurse has a district for her own to work in. All traveling is done a central headquarters, which is the home of the nurses also. Half of the staff do the general nursing and the other half attend to maternity.

The nurses travel to the outlying districts by auto, and to the districts closer to the depot by bicycle, which in the heart of an Australian summer day is certainly not very inviting. However, all of those who are called to try and help all those who are unable to get to hospitals for food and clothing. It has made wonderful progress in homes of the poor who are unable to go to hospitals for aid and in finding the patient who are suffering from either infectious or contagious diseases and having them sent to the hospital for treatment.

When the nurse enters the home in many cases she finds that chaos reigns but in a little while with a few instructions given, there is cleanliness and peace, and the patient is on the road to recovery.

The society work in connection with the women's hospital, and when there is a maternity call, the nurse who is on duty—only work 8 hours—for that district, calls the patient to her home and by so doing, she duty there goes to the address given by both the doctor and the nurse regarding her mother and by so doing, she makes of those children noble men and of the society; to give to the Mother

the best of care during this time, and also to keep her in the home, because it is always the Mother's influence which keeps the home together. The trouble is of course, that we have no prohibition in Australia. The father in such a case as above, instead of coming home on pay day, would wander off to the nearest hotel or bar and there leave the greater portion of his week's earnings. Whereas, with the Mother in the home, and the nurse and doctor coming in each day, more apt to think it necessary for the father to do his bit, just as the rest of the world does.

Of course there are cases where the father has lost all self respect through drink and is not able to provide for his family, but food and clothing for his wife and babe for these that the "Baby Bonus" as it is called, is a Heaven-sent blessing to such homes. It enables the Mother to get better food, better fuel, and also helps with the expenses of the house. There are always neighbors who are poor or sick, and it is very difficult enough to come in for the ten dollars. So if the Mother did not get the Baby Bonus it is very likely that she would be a pauper.
