Favorite Recipes

(Whenever this department is for you and contains only recipes that have proved successful. Your favorite recipes will be welcome. Address all communications to the care of this department.)

RIBBON SANDWICHES

(Recipe of Carolyn Bayne, Birmingham)

Cut your bread in very thin slices, trim off crusts until you have a perfect square. Take one-half of a package of Philadelphia cream cheese, add a little mayonnaise, a pinch of salt and a pinch of sugar. Grind half a sweet green pepper as fine as possible. Place in a square of thin muslin and squeeze out all of the juice. Be very careful to remove all seeds. Mix the green pepper and cream cheese mixture together. Spread a thin layer on the first slice of buttered bread. Add your second slice and press together well.

Now to the other half of your package of cream cheese add a little mayonnaise, salt and sugar, and a finely-chopped pimento or two. Spread this on your second piece of bread and then add a third slice, pressing together. Now for your next layer you might spread a little caviar if you like it, to which you have added a little melted butter and a speck of lemon juice. If you do not like caviar, put a layer of cream cheese mixed with a little mayonnaise, speck of salt, sugar, and add a tablespoon or two of finely-chopped English walnut meats. If you cannot buy some vegetable coloring matter you can make most attractive layers of blue, yellow and lavender with cream cheese as your foundation. You can also spread strawberry jam very thin on one layer. The cream cheese to press all of your layers together so that they will not come apart. This is very easy to do. Procure your husband's sharpest carving knife and slice down in thin slices. One of these sandwiches when finished will serve several people. When finished you will have something truly different and most delicious, a sandwich which will resemble a rainbow so beautifully do the colors blend together.

ROSE SANDWICHES

(Recipe of Carolyn Bayne, Birmingham)

Cut bread in very thin slices. Cut in round shape with cookie cutter. Spread with thin layer of plain cream cheese or cream cheese with green pepper and pimento chopped fine and strained thru cloth until perfectly dry. Cream three green peppers and English walnut meats chopped fine, or cream cheese with English walnut meats alone or with pimento. Any good sandwich filling may be used. Put on second slice of bread, press together, take a tiny bit of cream cheese (not more than an eighth of a teaspoon), roll in palm of hand to form a ball, sprinkle with paprika, cut tiny piece of sweet green pepper to resemble a leaf and place rose and leaf in center of sandwich, a truly fascinating morsel to behold, nest-egg past.

MOUSE SALAD

(Recipe of Carolyn Bayne, Birmingham)

Buy a good brand of canned pears, so you will have a perfect half of a pear. Put tiny piece of cream cheese at small end of pear, eyes, ears, nose and mouth. Place long, narrow strip at large end of pear for tail. Place mouse on crisp lettuce leaves. Make french dressing with oil, lemon juice, pear juice, salt and paprika. This makes a most delicious salad; easy to prepare and very inexpensive.

SNOW BALLS

(Recipe of Carolyn Bayne, Birmingham)

Take one inch square of any good light white layer cake. Ice with boiled white icing or marshmallow creme by first hand to finish on top, then rolling into fresh coconut, then another side, etc., until all four sides are covered. I have in mind a good brand of canned moist coconut which is every bit as good as the fresh, and so fluffy and white. Ask your grocer to give it to you.

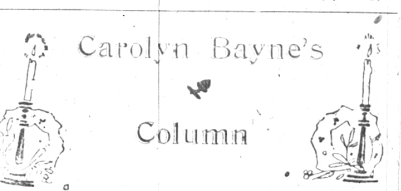
