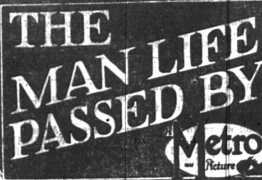

WORKERS REWARDED ON STUDEBAKER'S 71st ANNIVERSARY

Nearly 3,000 Employees Honored For Loyal Service Of 5 To 60 Years With Veteran Motor Manufacturer

(Special)—White-haired grandfathers, their sons and their grandsons stood shoulder to shoulder at the seventy-first birthday celebration observed the other day by the families of 2,900 employees of the Studebaker Corporation at South Bend and Detroit.

Nearly 3,000 artisans were awarded medals for continuous and loyal service of five, ten, twenty and up to sixty years with Studebaker, the oldest automobile manufacturer in the world.

Some Serve 60 Years. More than 2,300 received bronze medals for five or ten years service; 187 were awarded sterling silver medals for fifteen years, and 222 had gold medals pinned upon them for more than 20 years employment by the House of Studebaker. The last group included those employees who have been with the corporation from 20 to 60 years. They were cheered by their fellow workers as they received the honors.

For seventy-two years the name Studebaker has been linked, not only with every improvement in transportation, but with American industrial development as well. Since its inception in 1852 as a cross-roads blacksmithing and wagon-building shop, Studebaker has expanded to one of the greatest manufacturing institutions in the world, with \$50,000,000 of actual net assets, \$20,000,000 of plant facilities and an annual production capacity of 150,000 cars. Studebaker has 1,000 branches and dealers in the United States and is widely represented in all foreign countries.

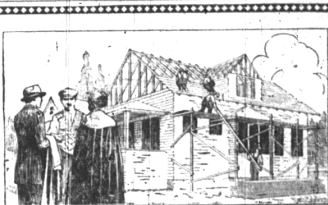
