Miss Viola Olson: "It would be impossible for me to tell which part of the journey I enjoyed most when on the tour with 'Billy' McBride and family. However, I do advise anyone coming West not to miss seeing the Grand Canyon, which, I think, was the most gorgeous and picturesque spot we visited."

Track Prospects

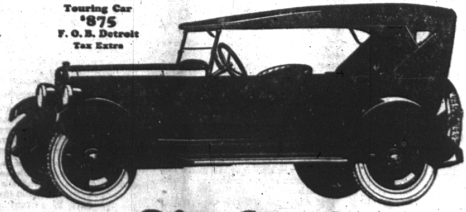
