Your Garden Beautiful
ADVANTAGES OF EARLY SPRING PLANTING

The advantages of early spring planting may be classed as real and psychological. By psychological advantage we mean that a state of mind is created in the home owner that causes him to make early preparation for his spring planting and garden work. In planning his work ahead he will know at the right time just what he is going to plant, where it is to be put and the approximate effect it will introduce. When the proper time for planting arrives he is able to procure his plant material and proceed on schedule time. It is assumed in this article that the householder has made ample provision for the principal advantage of planting in early spring has to do with the adaptation of the roots of the plant to their new home. It is necessary that the ground be well packed about the roots and that tiny rootlets be started before the plant shows any appreciable growth. Again, the spring rains will help to pack the soil about the roots of those plants which are set out early, whereas the plants set out later in the season may be afforded very little rain.
There is another reason, a very practical one, why early planting is desirable. The sources of plant supply are sometimes limited and a big demand on the part of the home owners may exhaust the supply in some times before the end of the season. Plants cannot be turned out to order in a few days. From one to ten or twenty years are required for their growth and often the most far seeing of plant growers may fail to take into account the wonderful growth which has been shown in the principal industrial centers of this country.
The time for planting trees, shrubs, evergreens and perennials in the spring is the time when the frost has disappeared. Except for the more tender varieties no harm will be experienced from the spring frosts. This year this locality has had a very deep frost line and more time is necessary to thaw out the frost. At the date of writing the frost is practically out of the ground except in shaded sections and except for the crust which has formed during the cool nights.
