GREAT CLASSIC LOVE STORY AT GARRICK NEXT WEEK

One of the greatest love stories ever written, "Philo and Francesca" will be the offering of the Bonstelle Company at the Garrick next week, beginning Monday night.

This play has been selected as the farewell bill for Miss Ann Harding, who came on to Detroit for a limited engagement. Miss Harding played "Philo" in this play at the Hodgepodge Theatre, Rose Valley, Pa. and it is to appear in it in New York in the autumn for a series of matinees with Martin Farley.

Several versions have been written of this famous love story, but Miss Bonstelle will use the one by Stephen Phillips, who wrote "Hered" and "Ulysses," which were produced by William Faversham. 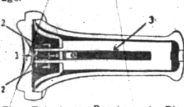

HERE'S A MECHANISM WITHOUT SCREWS

Ingenious Process of Welding Keeps Parts of Telephone Receiver Adjusted

It is a fact very of the first work of hand telephone of 1877 to use the telephone receiver of today. In the early types of the instrument it was necessary to contend with weakens magnets, varying adjustment, low inherent efficiency and breakage.



The receiver now in use in the Bell System is active in the telephone art. It employs no screws in its construction. By an ingenious welding process the essential working parts are held together in a rigid, homogeneous way, which completely eliminates all variation in adjustment.

Research and development work still continues on this instrument, and as a result of experiments a special kind of steel for the core was found that would increase its efficiency but at the same time it was discovered that this particular kind of steel could not be welded satisfactorily by the usual method. It was, therefore, necessary to develop a special method of welding in order to take advantage of the improvement obtained by this special material. The welded type of receiver is now going into the plant at the rate of over a million a year, and a large majority of the Bell-owned stations are now equipped with this instrument.

On the Week's Records

Zimbalist and Ponselle—Victor Herbert's Last Record

We haven't heard Zimbalist for some time, but his records this week make up for the hiatus. The first is beautifully beautiful, a "Spanish Dance" of surpassing quality for every resource of the artist. Equally exciting as a display number is a "Humoresque" by York Bowen, a madly capricious piece composed for such skill as Zimbalist's to interpret. It is new but not "Tutti's" "Tutti's Eye." Now hear Rosa Ponselle sing it on a new record. It is sung with Ponselle's lyrical smoothness and tragic power. On the other side she sings the same composer's biting, cherry-scented, accompanied solo by the harp.

Interesting Miscellaneous Selections

There may be some to whom Richard Crooks' records do not have so much appeal, but our secret guess, after hearing his latest, is that the music still satisfies you. "Love Is Mine" and "For You Alone" are not, however, of the lighter mode of love's ecstasy, but seem to encompass the full range of experience. They are melodious, unobtrusively harmonized, and splendidly sung.
